
Exam Schedule (Grades 7-12) June 9th-19th

Tuition Fees—2025-2026

A reminder that tuition fees for the coming 2025/2026 school year are payable starting July 1st, 2025. **If you are paying tuition through a monthly direct debit/pre-authorized withdrawal, the amount will automatically be updated to the new tuition fee amount.** The date (1st or 15th) and frequency will remain the same.

If you have replied to our 'Intention to Return' email that your child(ren) does not plan to return in September 2025, or if your child is graduating from Grade 12, your pre-authorized withdrawals will be stopped once your tuition fees for the current school year have been paid in full.

Used Book Sale—Gr. 7-12

We will once again be selling used textbooks over the summer months. Students will be informed soon of which books we will "buy back". We cannot accept textbooks that will not be used in the new school year or give credit for books that are in disrepair. Students must drop off books to be sold **no later** than Friday, June 20th, outside the office. Exciting New Additions to Our Grade 7 & 8 Program!

We're thrilled to announce two changes coming to our Grade 7 and 8 curriculum this year: Life Skills and Healthy Living and Aquatics Activities!

The **Life Skills** course is designed to equip students with essential strategies for academic success, including time management, critical thinking, effective study habits, and goal-setting. These skills will empower students to become more confident learners across all subjects. We will also be covering topics like conflict resolution, sewing, cooking, home repairs, personal finance, car maintenance, and gardening to help our students develop greater independence.

Additionally, our Grade 8 students will have the opportunity to earn a **Reach Ahead credit**, Healthy Living and Aquatics Activities (PAQ1O). The Grade 9 course offers a fun, hands-on opportunity to build water safety, swimming techniques, and endurance. This program promotes physical fitness, teamwork, and confidence in the water—vital skills for life and health. Students will opt-in to take this course instead of our regular Grade 8 PE class. Look for an information email and Google form from Dr. Brouwer in the coming week.

DNA Fingerprinting Workshop

On May 6th, 2025, the Grade 12 HOSA club members and the senior biology and kinesiology students participated in an immersive DNA Fingerprinting Workshop led by the Ontario Science Centre in collaboration with Toronto Metropolitan University. This full-day workshop took place in a professional biotechnology lab, providing students with a unique opportunity to engage in hands-on learning using advanced molecular biology equipment.

As part of the experience, students collected, amplified, and analyzed their own DNA through polymerase chain reaction (PCR) and gel electrophoresis. These are all core techniques used in any post-secondary biology programs, as well as modern genetics and forensic science. Their experiments yielded excellent results and gave students meaningful insight into the practical applications of biotechnology in fields such as criminal investigations, genetic research, and food authentication.

This workshop served as an exciting culmination to the molecular genetics unit and reinforced key classroom concepts through real-world application. It was a valuable and enriching experience that deepened students' understanding of the relevance of biotechnology in today's scientific landscape.

Summer 2025 ESL Credit Courses

This summer, NTCS will offer English as a Second Language credit courses during the month of August 2025 (Grades 9-12). These English courses (ESLCO, ESLDO and ESLEO) are designed for students whose first language is not English and will include 110 hours of classroom instruction.

The courses will satisfy Ontario Ministry of Education credit requirements that can be used to count toward the 30 credits students need to complete in order to receive their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). The class will run from Monday, July 28th to Thursday, August 21st from 8:45 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily. The cost is \$1250.00.
