Thank you to parents and guardians who attended the recent Parent/Teacher interviews through Google Meets and inperson. We want to ensure the very best success for each of your children and are grateful for opportunities to have direct contact with you. If at any time during the school year you require further information or clarification, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher through the school office or by email.

Travel and Absences during vacation times...

Families who choose to have their children take extended holiday time should be aware of several matters. First, for attendance purposes, please let the office know in writing (email to office@ntcs.on.ca) if your child(ren) will be away for an extended time, before and/or beyond the designated holidays. Secondly, students who take extended holiday time are considered absent and will be recorded as such. This could have an impact on high school students who jeopardize their credit in any course if they miss more than 15 classes in the school year.

Also, it is not practical for teachers to supplement and plan out individual programs for those on vacation. Students will need to use their Google classroom(s) and be in communication with classmates, to stay up-to-date with their studies. It is the responsibility of the student to "catch up" on work missed during their absence.

Winter Clothing Drive & Note-Writing Party

We thank you for your ongoing support of the NTCS program through your involvement in school activities, your encouragement of the teaching staff and your support of your child in their daily school life. Please continue to pray for the health and safety of the students, staff, administration, and the Board of Directors as we continue to work together to build a strong and positive school community.

Elementary Cold Weather Policy

Our primary concern is always for the safety of our students. We will only take the children outside when it is safe to do so. The guidelines established are that when the combined temperature and wind chill are **-25C** or lower, the students will remain indoors due to the risk of frostbite. When temperatures with the wind chill factor are between **-20C** and **-25C**, we will shorten recesses to approximately 10 minutes depending on the local conditions, such as if it is sunny, windy, or currently snowing. The teachers on yard duty have also been instructed to use their discretion and to shorten recess to ensure student safety and welfare when necessary. At temperatures above **-20C**, students will go out for regular recess.



It is important that parents send their children with clothing that allows them to participate in outdoor activities every day during the winter months. Extra socks and mitts in your child's bag are strongly recommended. An extra set of clothing, especially for the younger children, is also a good idea. Please note that if you feel your child is not well enough to participate in recess due to recent illness or not feeling well, then it would be wise to keep them at home until they are able to participate fully in all aspects of the school program. Please <u>label</u> all winter clothing.

On especially cold days when the students are inside after school, students should be picked up at the north side track doors.

Winter Weather Policy

Snow, cold, slippery roads and the traffic congestion they cause will be with us soon. Our school policy is to remain open on all school days no matter what the weather (unless, of course, the whole city is closed down). However, you must decide for your own family whether it is safe and whether it makes sense to send or take your child(ren) to school on any specific day. On **very bad weather days** when many schools within the city limits are closed, absences will not be counted, so students will not be penalized.

It is important, however, that parents take the weather into consideration when dropping off their children in the morning and/or picking them up in the evening. Leaving earlier from home in the morning or from work, if possible, in the evening might be helpful to avoid unnecessary traffic problems and to avoid late pick-up charges. Also, it is a good idea to have a back-up plan in place with a friend, a family member, or another school parent in the event that it is impossible for you to pick up your child on any given day due to major winter delays.

WINTER CHANDOS SCHEDULE

We are pleased to continue our outdoor education trips to our camp facility on Chandos Lake this winter. They will commence a week after school begins for students in Grades 3-9! The winter packing list can be found on our school website. Stay tuned for more information.

Parents who wish to accompany an elementary class on their trip are required to have a Vulnerable Sector Check (VSC). Please email Dr. Brouwer your interest.

Please consider applying for the VSC as soon as possible, as the process can take some time and without sufficient supervision for our elementary classes, we may not be able to send the students at certain grade levels.

From the Guidance Office.....for Grade 12 students

As students work on their applications to university and college, please keep the following in mind:

An application is not processed until payment is made. No information is sent to the institution that a student applies to until OCAS and/or OUAC is paid. There are several payment options, but the easiest one is the online option.

Information in an application can be changed at any time, even after payment and submission. Changes to name, address and program selections can be done by the student. Changes in course information will need to be brought to the guidance office for processing.

Once universities and colleges have received an application, they will generally send the student an email asking them to create an account—this is an important step. They will use the account to communicate with the student about supplemental applications and special deadlines.

Please be mindful of deadlines for your child's specific program and scholarships. If your child has not heard from a school about specifics and they were expecting to, then a quick email or phone call can make a big difference.

If your child is applying to schools outside Ontario, there may be different deadlines, so please be aware of this and plan accordingly. They may need to submit transcripts. Please allow at least two school days for the school office to generate these and have them signed.

If your child has not attended an English speaking school for all four years of high school, they may be required to provide proof of English language proficiency. This is their responsibility. Please make sure they understand the directions for submitting these documents.
