# GRACE PLACE FOOD BANK FUNDRAISER & NTCS GAMES—May 30<sup>th</sup>

The Service and Leadership Team (SaLT) is preparing for our annual NTCS Games event alongside our Spring Fundraiser. We are excited to partner with **Grace Place Food Bank**, in Scarborough, to help support their food bank ministry. Their desire is to strengthen and serve our community through the love of Jesus and see lives transformed and people set free. As recent statistics show that as many as 1 in 10 people in Toronto are now relying on food banks, we have an opportunity to meet a very serious need in our local neighbourhoods and demonstrate the care and compassion of Christ. Paired with the power of the gospel, your donations will not only help the hungry, but plant seeds of lasting hope.

Our school theme for this year has been "Be Like Jesus" (Philippians 2:5). Through chapel services and homeroom devotionals, the students of NTCS have been learning that God desires for each of us to think and act like Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit. We have several examples in the gospels of Jesus meeting physical needs while emphasizing the greater spiritual need of all humanity. By partnering with Grace Place, we desire and pray that many lives will experience what it means to truly "never go hungry and...never be thirsty." (John 6:35)

This second clinic will offer **Hepatitis B, Human Papillomavirus (HPV)**, and **Meningococcal vaccines** to Grade 7/8 students who received their first dose in November 2023 or who missed the first clinic.

#### Summer School


#### **Scholarships**

## 2024 Pascal/Cayley/Fermat Math Contest Results

On the 28<sup>th</sup> of February, 62 students from Grades 9-11 competed in the Pascal (9), Cayley (10), and Fermat (11) math contests. A perfect score on these tricky and challenging, mostly multiple choice contests is 150. Our top finishers on this year's Pascal Contest, each achieving a score in the top 25% worldwide, were **Natalie Lau** (120), **Ivan Wang** (112), **Maggie Wang** (110), **Amen Ng** (105), and **Charis Kwok** (103). Top 25% finishers on the Cayley Contest were **Yuhan Liu** (128), **Kenneth Wu** (126), **Zachary Chan** (122), **Samuel Barradas-Villeges** (120), **Noah Xia** (116), and **Isaac Vant Erve** (114), while on the Fermat Contest (the toughest of the three), **Bill Liu** (102), **Joyce Lau** (101), and **Nikolas Kaounis** (99) came out on top.

## Grade 6 Trip to the Aga Khan Museum

The Grade 6 classes visited the *Aga Khan Museum*, a museum of Islamic art, located in North York, on Friday, April 12<sup>th</sup>. The full-day trip involved a guided tour of the facilities where students observed objects in the art collection and learned about different cultures, history, and art. They also participated in two workshops. During the *Pattern Play* workshop, students examined various patterns and motifs found within the Muslim world and then, inspired by the Museum collection, created and designed their own clay tiles.

In the Silk Route Adventures workshop, the students examined objects that travelled on or were inspired by goods found along the Silk Route, as they learned about the role that trade plays in cross-cultural connections. Students explored how luxury goods, languages, resources, and cultures were shared and traded in the ancient world. They also had the opportunity to play the Museum's custom-made board game, which simulates life along the Silk Route. The excursion was a fitting introduction to our social studies unit on International Trade.

## Grade 11/12 Law Class Visits the Courthouse

On Thursday, April 18<sup>th</sup>, the Grade 11 and 12 Law classes collectively went to the Ontario Superior Court on University Ave to observe criminal trials. Three trials ended up on the menu: the first was a high-profile case of a police officer being killed by a vehicle in a garage under Nathan Phillips Square in 2021--which later seemed to have ended in an acquittal; the second was a case of domestic violence, an aggravated assault with a weapon; and the last was a weapons charge. The latter two trials had the accused in the courtroom during the procedures. The students found this excursion to be a very valuable learning experience.






