Donations – NTCS

Thank you to all parents and guardians who generously made cash donations to the school over the recent Christmas season. In order to encourage people to donate to charities (like NTCS), the government of Canada and the Canada Revenue Agency are extending the period of time to make donations that qualify for tax benefits in 2024. Any donations made before February 28, 2025 will qualify for a tax deductible receipt to gain a tax benefit in your personal income tax filing for 2024. If you have younger children ready for school next year, please register them soon as we are accepting applicants for the coming school year now. Application forms can be found on our website under "Downloads".

Tuition Rates 2025-2026

The following are the tuition rates for the academic school year 2025/2026 set at the recent Board of Directors meeting.

Canadian/resident rate:

One child:	\$13812 or \$1151/month	(an increase of \$ 1140/year or \$95/month)
Two children:	\$22092 or \$1841/month	(an increase of \$ 1812/year or \$151/month)
Three children:	\$27624 or \$2302/month	(an increase of \$ 2280/year or \$190/month)
Four children:	\$28728 or \$2394/month	(an increase of \$ 2376/year or \$198/month)

These changes represent a general increase of 9.0%.

International Student rate: \$20920 (an increase of \$1730 or 9.0%)
(includes twelve months health insurance coverage; reduces to Canadian/resident rate after one year of attendance; family discounts available after one year of attendance)

One-time fees upon admission include: Registration Fee (\$250 for first child, \$200 for subsequent children) and Capital Fee (\$2500 per family)

NTCS is a non-profit, charitable organization that operates the school and camp programs. Our goal is to keep our active, comprehensive program affordable for as many families as possible. Costs continue to increase in many areas. In particular, as we have moved to a smaller class size model in our program (currently our average class size is 19), we require additional staff to teach more, smaller classes. And our teaching staff need to be paid appropriately to allow them to live in an increasingly expensive Toronto and GTA. Transportation costs are increasing with our active busing program to Chandos and to the many sports events, field trips, and class outings that make NTCS a busy, active school. Our energy costs have increased with the recent addition of the carbon tax. The interest rate on the school property mortgage almost doubled in 2024. Despite these factors, be assured that the tuition fees are raised carefully to ensure that NTCS remains in a strong financial position. The tuition fee will continue to cover all program expenses so families will NOT be charged additional fees for trips to Chandos, field trips, sports team participation, musical instrument rentals, and pizza days.

NTCS Board of Directors

NTCS is a non-profit charitable organization that is governed by a volunteer board of directors who oversee all aspects of the school programming, staffing, facilities and finances. At their recent meeting, three members of the board stepped down from their roles and we gratefully acknowledge their service to the school community.

Mrs. Barbara Dempsey served on the board for thirteen years, most recently for a number of years as board Chair, leading the directors in their decision-making about important matters of school governance. Serving many years after her three boys all graduated from NTCS, Mrs Dempsey played a vital role in the management of the school program during her tenure on the board.

Mr. Ken Hung also remained on the board of directors for a number of years after his two daughters graduated from NTCS, serving for almost ten years in total. His contribution to board discussions and decisions was very much valued over this period, and we appreciate his commitment to serving the school community during his time on the board.

We also thank **Mrs. Rachel Goligher** for her three years of service on the board of directors. With children enrolled in NTCS at various grade levels, Mrs. Goligher has been able to provide valuable input to board matters, having a perspective of a parent with children of different ages active in the school program.

We thank these three members for volunteering their time and taking on the responsibility involved in providing governing oversight to the operation of the NTCS charity.

With Mrs. Dempsey's departure from the board, **Mr. Jason Kwok** will take over responsibility as Chair, and **Mrs. Ann-Marie Crouse** will take over from Mr. Kwok as Secretary to the board.

Annual Bake Sale

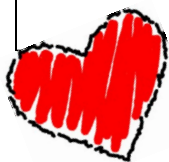

Elementary Cold Weather Policy

Our primary concern is always for the safety of our students. We will only take the children outside when it is safe to do so. The guidelines established are that when the combined temperature and wind chill are **-28C** or lower, the students will remain indoors due to the risk of frostbite. When temperatures with the wind chill factor are between **-20C and -28C**, we will shorten recesses to approximately 10 minutes depending on the local conditions, such as if it is sunny, windy, or currently snowing. The teachers on yard duty have also been instructed to use their discretion and to shorten recess to ensure student safety and welfare when necessary. At temperatures above **-20C**, students will go out for regular recess.

It is important that parents send their child(ren) with clothing that allows them to participate in outdoor activities every day during the winter months. Please note that students will be playing outside during extended care and before and after school, so it is essential that extra clothing be packed, especially items like mitts, socks, and pants. On extremely cold days, students in extended care will wait in the track area until they are picked up from the NORTH doors.

If you feel your child is not well enough to participate in recess due to recent illness or not feeling well, then it would be wise to keep them at home until they are able to participate fully in all aspects of the school program. Proper supervision of the children becomes difficult when students are not able to go outside.

Winter Weather Policy

The winter months are still with us, as is the potential for more snow and extreme cold, slippery roads, and greater traffic congestion.



Very wintry days often result in many students arriving late. Please remember to take the weather into consideration when dropping off your child(ren) in the morning and/or picking them up in the evening. Leaving earlier from home in the morning or from work, if possible, in the evening is helpful to avoid unnecessary traffic problems and to avoid late pick-up charges if your child(ren) are in extended care. Also, it is essential to have a back-up plan in place in the event that it is impossible for you to pick up your child(ren) on any given day due to major winter delays.

Our school policy is to remain open on all school days no matter what the weather (unless, of course, the whole city is closed down). However, you must decide for your own family whether it is safe and whether it makes sense to send or take your child(ren) to school on any specific day. On **very bad weather days**, when many schools within the city limits are closed, students will not be penalized for an absence.

From the Guidance Office...

Term 1 report cards for Grade 7-12 students were sent to families by email on Friday, January 31st. The deadline for Grade 11 and 12 students to drop a course and have it NOT appear on their transcript is Friday, February 7th. Drop course forms can be requested from Mr. Brown at cbrown@ntcs.on.ca and must be returned and approved before a student can stop attending the class. Please note that a student must take a minimum of seven courses in Grade 11 and six courses in Grade 12 to continue their studies at NTCS.

Keep checking your OUAC, OCAS and specific university or college student accounts to stay informed about any outstanding requirements or notices of acceptance.

Congratulations to our students who have already received acceptance letters for the programs to which they applied based on their academic achievement in Grade 11! I trust that we will continue to be made aware of more great news as the universities and colleges process the remaining applications in the coming months.

SKI DAY—Grades 4-12!

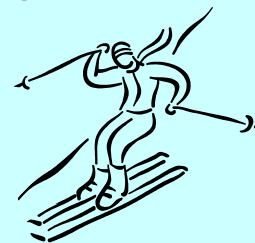
Our annual ski trip to Mount St. Louis/Moonstone is happening this month! We are excited to offer Grade 4 to 12 students an opportunity to spend the day on the slopes with their friends on Thursday, **February 20th**.

Once you have completed the online registration, please send an e-transfer payment to admin@ntcs.on.ca. In the message box, please include your child(ren)'s name(s) and indicate that the payment is for the ski trip.

The fee for this trip is as follows:

1. **\$77** - Includes lift ticket, lesson, and transportation
2. **\$98** - Includes lift ticket, lesson, ski rentals, and transportation
3. **\$57** - Ski pass holder and transportation



If renting equipment, students **must be renting skis**. For safety reasons, we do not allow students to rent snowboarding equipment for this trip.

All students will be required to do a ski-off, and the instructors will put each student into a lesson, based on their demonstrated skill level. The ski-off ensures a fun and safe time for all participants on the trip.

For students who do not register for the ski trip, it will be a **regular school day**. Spaces will be reserved on a first-come, first-served basis until the buses are full. In order to successfully reserve your spot, **registration and payment** must be completed.

The deadline to register is **Thursday, February 13th, 2025**.

Primary Praise & Junior Mini-Chapel:

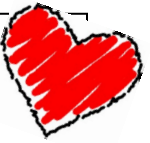


Winter Chandos

2024 Beaver Computing Challenge

In the days between November 4th and 15th, NTCS students from Grades 5 through 10 participated in the Beaver Computing Challenge, created and administered by the University of Waterloo's Centre for Education in Mathematics and Computing (CEMC). It is a brightly coloured, very visual, 45-minute online multiple choice contest designed to introduce students to the kinds of problems often tackled by computer scientists and to gauge interest and ability in this exciting and high-demand discipline. Camp Ke-Mon-Oya Registration Has Begun!

ONLINE REGISTRATION IS AVAILABLE AT CAMP KEMONOYA.COM

Once again, our camp program will operate this upcoming summer. If your child attended last summer, you will already have received a brochure by email, along with an income tax receipt. Brochures and application forms are now available online for those students who are interested in attending. As registrations are received on a first-come, first-served basis, it is important that you submit your application early for the week(s) you want in order to avoid the disappointment of them being full later.

The first 2 weeks are Junior camp, starting Monday, July 7th, for students entering Grades 3-6 in September. The last 3 weeks are Teen weeks, starting Monday, July 21st, for students going into Grades 7-10.

In the past, some of our students have participated in camp life as a Leader-in-Training (LIT) or camp counsellor. The LIT program runs during the first 3 weeks of July. Students must be entering Grade 11 in September 2025 to be eligible. This program includes Bible study, leadership seminars, activity training and helping out around the camp wherever needed. For the final week, LITs assist a senior counsellor in a cabin as a junior counsellor and help with camp activities.

There are also some openings for senior counsellors. Students must be at least 15 years of age to work at Junior Camp and at least 17 years old to work at Teen Camp. Students must complete an application form and be interviewed in order to be considered for the LIT program or for a counsellor position.
